The word Lent is derived from the Anglo–Saxon words *lencten*, meaning 'Spring', and also associated with the season associated with the 'lengthen of days'. We are so greatly blessed here in south Devon when we see the flowers that bloom from Candlemas through to Easter Day.

Anyone visiting Ashcombe Church cannot fail to notice the abundance of snowdrops, a symbol of hope and beauty. Snowdrops are also sometimes referred to as 'Candlemas Bells'. At a time of year within the lectionary of the Christian church, in all their glory 'Candlemas Bells' ring in the changes as we turn from the coming of Jesus here on earth – towards his dying and rising again during Holy Week and into the Easter season.

The primrose will shortly be visible blooming in the hedgerows, and this flower is associated with loyalty and faithfulness, purity and honesty. During the season of Lent there is the call for us to be refreshed in our own lives as we reflect on the teachings of Jesus, especially the call to pray and to grow deeper into the knowledge of God's love so freely offered to all who call on his name in faith.

For us today these words of William Wordsworth can offer such hope in this current time of uncertainty: '...... when all at once I saw a crowd, a host of golden daffodils; fluttering and dancing in the breeze'. The Marie Curie Charity adopted this flower as their symbol for offering light into the dark areas of people's lives, and in Germany the daffodil is referred to not only as the Lent Lily, but also the 'Easter Bell'.

And as Lent comes to an end with Holy Week, the churches are then filled on Easter Day with white Lilies; a symbol of resurrection and renewal of life.

This year, as we reflect on the message of the flowers that bloom during this season of Lent, there is also the call to look forward to the good news of the celebration of the promise of life in abundance that Easter brings. The flowers that appear in the hedgerows in the Spring can also offer hope and light in these times of uncertainty.

This year the Haldon Team churches in Teignmouth are working towards the hosting of a 'Community Art Project'. The crocheted and knitted flowers will be displayed during Easter week as the church opens its doors and welcomes both pilgrims and tourists. Then the flower posies will be distributed to bring light and hope to those who have been isolated, in care homes and to key workers in the area. The Beavers, Cubs and Scouts have continued to meet online during Lockdown 3. All sections took part in another 'virtual camp' over the Christmas holidays, where they made blanket dens at home to sleep in, linked up with each other on Zoom and tried to complete the Twelve Good Turns of Christmas.

We have had some interesting guest speakers on Zoom this term. Firefighter Peter Fogden covered the Fire Safety badge with cubs in January. In February, Helen Hamston has taught the Beavers and Cubs the basics of British Sign Language for their Communicator Badge.

BISHOPSTEIGNTON PARISH COUNCIL

Many of you will be aware that local authorities finalise preparation of their budgets for the forthcoming financial Year during January and February. As part of this process, the Parish Council agreed it's 2021/22 budget at the meeting on the 18 January 2021.

The Parish Council budget shows an increase of 2.25%, compared with 2020/21, however, due to reduced funding from Teignbridge District Council the total increase will be 4.67%. You will see this on your Council Tax bill for 2021/22 which you will receive from Teignbridge District Council during March.

The Parish Council will always try to keep any increase to a minimum. However, to deliver a good service, take on limited additional responsibilities and strive to improve our village environment as we have been doing, it is extremely difficult to limit any increase to the average inflation rate on our limited budget.

The Parish Council budget total increase over 2020/21 is £1,362 To put this increase in context the impact on a Band D Council Tax payer will be £2.23 per annum.

The Parish Council will always seek funding opportunities to enhance services to the community wherever possible.

If there are any matters on the budget, or indeed any other Parish Council services you may wish to discuss, then I will be pleased for you to contact me.

There will also be a specific opportunity in April for any parishioner to attend, virtually, the Annual Parish Meeting, where a reports on the work of the Parish Council and that of other Groups in the community will be discussed. The actual date, time and details for access will be publicised shortly.

Bishopsteignton Probus Club

On Tuesday, 19th January, Simon Dell, an author of books about Lundy Island, made a zoom presentation on the subject. Lundy Island was named in Nordic by invading Vikings and it means Puffin Island after the gorgeous puffins which live there. It measures three miles by a half-mile off the north Devon coast with the Bristol Channel on one side and the Atlantic Ocean on the other side. It was owned by Orbian Harvey who died in 1968, after which it was purchased by Jack Hayward, who donated it to the National Trust which leases it to the Landmark Trust. Tourists visit during the summer, travelling for two hours on board the Island's boat, the Oldenberg from Bideford and Ilfracombe. On the journey to Lundy, passengers can see porpoises and dolphins and on Lundy they can see the famous puffins which feed on sand eels and white bait, together with various other animals, including deer, goats, sheep and ponies.

In 1819, Trinity House built a lighthouse on the top of Lundy, but it was so high the light could not be seen by ships and another one had to be built much nearer to sea level in 1896. During the second world war, a German bomber was on fire and landed on Lundy, where the crew surrendered to residents and were kept there until they could be shipped to Fremington army camp.

The island has a small population and a village comprising the Marisco Tavern, a general store, houses and a church. Tourists can visit for the day or can rent accommodation, where the properties range from the single accommodation radio room to 3, 4 and 5 bedroomed cottages, a 12-bedroom mansion house and the barn which sleeps up to eighteen students.

On Tuesday, 2nd February, Ron Franklin gave a zoom presentation, watched by 38 members and guests. He gave a detailed account of the many national parks and tourist sites in America. Members were shown photos of many wild animals which range the vast wild and protected spaces, including bison, together with photos of the beautiful scenery, including rivers and multi-coloured mountains which contain various salts that give them such beautiful colours. He showed slides with many interesting activities at tourist spots, including a wild west stagecoach in the desert area used for John Wayne western movies, a re-enactment of the American War of Independence and native Americans dressed in traditional gear, performing in one of the many festivals put on for tourists.

Ron showed photos and explained that tepees were used by native Americans as more flexible and more transportable accommodation whereas wigwams had wooden frames and were more permanent, whilst longhouses were large structures with wooden frames and coverings which often accommodated a whole village, thus giving more warmth and protection.

America has more than eight hundred million tourists annually, including 57 million campers and seven million staying in lodges and cabins.

Chairman designate Peter Hartley gave the vote of thanks, commenting positively on the fascinating and wide-ranging combination of history and geography that Ron had covered in his talk.

Peter's Progress

Having done more research into the various routes for climbing Kilimanjaro, Peter decided to take the Marangu route which has a number of camps with hut accommodation to ensure a good night's sleep.

The first stage is Marangu gate which was passed in January.

The next stage is Marangu Hut (8,858 ft) which was reached on 5th February.

The next stage is Harombo Hut (12,250 ft) and was reached on 17th February.

The next stage is Kibo hut (15,421ft) which he expects to reach by 28th February.

He is on track for a summit of Uhuru peak (19,341 ft) by mid-March.

£1710 has been pledged already but he is asking everyone to dig deep for the excellent cause of supporting the brave volunteer crew of Teignmouth RNLI.

More News from Sustainable Bishop

Community Allotment

Still due to the current situation and weather conditions I'm sorry to report that we are still not having sessions on the community allotment. Hopefully next month we will be in a position to inform you of future dates when we can again have our community allotment get togethers.

Although we are not on the plot as a group, there is still lots to do, whether at home in your own garden or helping to prepare for the growing season on the allotment, for example:

- Still continue to chit your potatoes.
- Continue planning your planting program.
- Get ahead and seed early peas and lettuces for an early crop.
- Warm up your growing area by covering it, which will enhance germination of seeds you will be planting soon.
- Continue to harvest the last of the winter veg.
- Continue to clean your pots and equipment to prevent disease.
